### A Message From The President of NATF

#### Dear Friends:

Educating patients, families, and healthcare providers about thrombotic illnesses has been a primary focus for NATF since its inception in 2006. We believe that comprehensive education is the key to preventing and managing pulmonary embolism (PE), deep vein thrombosis (DVT), stroke, heart attack, peripheral artery disease, and diabetes. Our educational programs, online content, patient stories, and cutting-edge updates provide a unique and critical service. Physicians, nurses, and pharmacists continually rely on NATF to supplement their knowledge, and patients know that they can depend on us for accurate information and emotional support. This past year, NATF focused on raising awareness about the overlapping risk factors and pathophysiology of PE, heart attack, and stroke. Our annual Thrombosis Summit in September utilized an interactive case study to illustrate this important concept. Experts in preventive cardiology, vascular medicine, heart failure, and heart transplant came together to discuss optimal treatment and management strategies in a 59-year-old patient who presented to the emergency department with a heart attack.

In 2020, we are undertaking a concentrated effort to provide thrombosis education in two critically important populations: patients with cancer and patients who are hospitalized with

2019 was a landmark year. We maintained a robust national and international presence, holding symposia in Los Angeles, New York, Washington DC, Nashville, Detroit, San Francisco, and Paris.

We had the pleasure of hosting our colleagues from Israel for an intensive 5-day vascular medicine course at Brigham and Women's Hospital. We held an engaging patient program on polyvascular disease and documented sharply increased participation in our in-person and online support groups. Our inaugural focus groups further provided patients and healthcare providers a venue to voice feedback on our current initiatives and their educational needs.

Regarding human resources, we now have four full-time staff members. Kathryn Mikkelsen, Executive Director of NATF, recently obtained her MBA from the Boston University Questrom School of Business. Courtney Anderson, our Associate Director, is taking courses in hopes of furthering her medical education. We also hired two new staff members, Aviva Schwartz and Claire Galvin. Aviva has her master's degree in Health Communication and Claire is currently taking evening courses to obtain her Master of Public Health degree.



acute medical illnesses such as pneumonia. heart failure, stroke, and inflammatory diseases. Both patient groups have an unacceptably high risk for blood clots, despite proven preventive strategies. This spring, we will be bringing together several international experts for a twoday symposium on thrombosis

and cancer. We will also be publishing the Anticoagulation Action Initiative (AAI) in the *American Journal of Medicine*. The AAI will address thrombosis prevention in hospitalized medically ill patients.

As President of NATF, I take this opportunity to thank our staff, Board of Directors, consulting experts and opinion leaders, and most importantly, the patients, families, and public who provide us with the inspiration and resources to educate and innovate.

support and shows you that by working together, we can continue to fight blood clots through education.




